### 2. Federicus Commandinus

*Text*: complete, from the Greek, including a commentary and demonstrations by Pappus Alexandrinus; some of the demonstrations are presented by Wallis as by Aristarchus.

*Biogr.* :

Federicus Commandinus (Federico Commandini) was born in Urbino 1509, died there 3 Sept. 1575. Studied grammar, Greek and mathematics under Jacopo Torelli and Giampietro de' Grassi. Was at the papal Curia under Clement VII, and again under Marcellus II. Studied philosophy under Marcantonio Passero (Genova), and medicine under Giambattista Montano at Padua, 1534-44. Received his medical degree at Ferrara under Ant. Brasavola. Practised medicine in Urbino. After the death of his wife and son, he turned to mathematics and spent the remainder of his life in the service of Duke Guidubaldo II of Urbino whom he taught fortification and geography, of Card. Ranuccio Farnese, and of Duke Francesco Maria II of Urbino. He was visited by John Dee, and edited with him a Latin version from the Arabic of Muhammed of Bagdad's *De superficierum divisionibus*. He also corresponded with

Cardan, Clavius, Dasypodius and Maurolycus.

He edited and annotated Arabo-Latin translations of Archimedes and Ptolemy. He translated from the Greek, and partly annotated, writings of Apollonius, Archimedes, Aristarchus, Euclid, Eutocius, Hero, Pappus and Serenus. His most important original works are *De centro gravitatis solidorum*, and *Horologiorum descriptio*.
